Companion Animal Population Management

WSAVA is aware that there are companion animal overpopulation issues throughout the world. The International Companion Animal Management (ICAM) Coalition has developed protocols for the humane management of cat and dog populations. WSAVA has a strong relationship with many animal organizations throughout the world and we would like to offer ICAM's solution as a good example of how population management can be conducted in a humane manner, leading to improvement in the welfare of the companion animal population as a whole.
