

Veterinary Healthcare Team Fact Sheet: Canine Cutaneous Soft Tissue Sarcoma

BACKGROUND

15% of all skin tumors in dogs.

CLINICAL SIGNS

 A non-painful cutaneous or subcutaneous skin mass. Mobile or fixed.
Soft or firm.



DIAGNOSIS

- Cytology can be highly suggestive.
- Histopathology, performed in a veterinary laboratory, is required for definitive diagnosis and grade.

HISTOPATHOLOGIC GRADE

- Predicts outcome.
- Grades I/II low metastatic potential.
- ▶ Grade III 40% develop metastatic disease.



THERAPY

- ▶ Treatment of choice: surgery.
- Goal: Visible tumour plus surrounding tissue margin, of several centimeters, including 1 fascial plane deep. Amputation may be necessary.
- Incompletely resected tumors: Scar revision or radiation therapy.
- Chemotherapy may be recommended for Grade III tumors. Efficacy data is lacking.



PROGNOSIS

Prognosis with Grade I/II and complete excision > 3 years.
